# ATTENDANCE MATTERS

#### Why it is Important to Attend School Regularly?

- To give your child the best possible start in life
- They will be able to keep up with their work
- They will achieve better results
- They will develop friendships and social skills

The government has set a target of 95% attendance for all pupils. This rate allows for periods of illness or particular circumstances when absence from school is unavoidable. We want your child to attend school regularly as this supports their learning.

#### Some Key Attendance Facts:

- Attending 90% of the time or less will have a serious effect on learning.
- One day's absence every two weeks will give 90% attendance.
- Up to the age of 16, 90% attendance will mean losing over a year of school

#### Parent Fines for term-Time Holidays Continue to Rise

The number of fines issued to parents for unauthorised term-time holidays increased by almost a quarter in the past academic year, local government data has revealed.

This represented an increase compared with the previous academic year, according to data released by the DfE. 91% of the total penalty notices issued were for unauthorised holidays. Please can parents and carers ensure that they do not take children out of school during term for holiday, the school is unable to authorise these absence requests.

# Middle

#### **Music & Dance**

We were very fortunate at the end of last term to be invited to a workshop at Congleton Town Hall lead by Love Music Trust. Working as an ensemble we produced our own sounds and learnt some new songs. There are some talented musicians in Darwin and Thompson who can keep the beat, play and follow a rhythm, sing and dance. This term we have been joined by Ron, a qualified dance instructor, and he has been showing us some cool moves. Dance is a great way to keep fit and flexible as well as a form of artistic expression.

#### Gardening & Other Life-Skills

Darwin have made a start on the allotment plot this term, clearing the beds from last season and planting new seeds for this year. We are hoping some of them may bear fruit before the end of the year.

Thompson class, meanwhile, have focused on their own individual targets. Can't tie your shoe-lace?- let's show you how! Never changed a light bulb or put batteries in a toy?- here, you can fix this! The two classes will swap roles after half-term.

## Art

After gardening, Darwin like to do art. This term has been about resistance techniques. Resistance techniques involve using a material to block the medium e.g paint, creating patterns and designs by preventing colour reaching certain areas.







#### Adventure Learning

Adventure learning has moved to The Social Farm. The children have fed the animals, including the lambs, chicks and even alpacas

The BTEC Level 2 Food Tech class have all completed their practical assessments and the final products were beautifully presented and were very tasty. The students really challenged themselves and showed amazing cooking skills.

Some of our year 10 students have been volunteering in our allotment during their break times. Their commitment to improving the shared space and working as a team is great to see.

In Life Skills, Gamma class have been looking at clothes labels and how to wash them. In the photos you can see the students sorting and reading the labels to see what cycle they would need to use on the washing machine. They did a great job! # Recipe Time

# Raspberry & White Chocolate Blondies

# **Theme:** Summer Tastes



# **Ingredients:**

- 130g unsalted butter, cut into cubes, plus extra for greasing
- 125g white chocolate, chopped into chunks
- 100g soft light brown sugar
- 100g golden caster sugar
- 2 free-range eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 200g plain flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- A pinch of salt
- 150g fresh raspberries
- 25g alternative to flaked almonds

# **Equipment:**

- Baking tin
- Weighing scales
- Saucepan
- Bow
- Whisk
- Fork
- Sieve
- Measuring spoons
- Mixing spoon
- Large spoon

# Instructions

Grease and line a 20cm/8in square tin with baking paper. Set aside 25g of the white chocolate for decoration.

Melt the butter with half the remaining white chocolate in a bowl, either in the microwave or suspended over a pan of simmering water. Tip into a large bowl and leave to cool for 2–3 minutes.

Add both types of sugar to the melted butter and whisk for 2–3 minutes until the mixture is thoroughly combined and slightly paler in colour.

Add the eggs and vanilla and mix again to combine.

Sift the flour and baking powder into the bowl, add the salt and mix again to thoroughly combine. Fold in the remaining white chocolate chunks.

Fold in 100g/3½oz raspberries. Spoon the mixture into the tin and level the surface. Scatter with the remaining raspberries and flaked almonds.

Bake for about 30 minutes 160C until firm, risen and golden brown. Leave in the tin to cool completely.
